#### **Target Audience:**

Criminal justice stakeholders involved with or impacted by the pretrial decision or those who are interested in learning about pretrial justice: Judges, magistrates, defense counsel, prosecutors, legislators, Sheriffs, county commissioners, jail command staff, pretrial directors and practitioners.

#### **Description:**

The bipartisan task force on jail and pretrial incarceration initiated by Executive Order 2019-10 makes pretrial justice and bail reform more important than ever in Michigan. This training is designed to provide the attendees with key concepts regarding pretrial justice and their practical application to the bail decision.

- Discuss litigation challenging the use of financial bail and the impact / implications it has for pretrial justice
- Learn how other states have enacted bail reform through legislation and other initiatives
- Explore moving to a risk based system and look at risk in the context of the release decision
- Review the Essential Elements required for a high functioning pretrial system
