Since its formal organization on January 12, 1819, Oakland County has led by example in the pioneering and entrepreneurial spirit. This map identifies those places which are recognized as making a significant contribution to the history and development of this area, state and nation. Communities honored with the designation of National Historic District are represented by the smaller inset maps. The shaded areas on these maps may represent both the National Historic District boundary, in addition to any local historic district boundary.
